

be sure that in our efforts that we remember this, respect this, and nurture the positives even when negatives can often come hand in hand with them.


We have the joy and honor of each other's company through all of these events. We have the privilege of this time and this life.

There have been some other changes in kingdom policy that should ensure that the Kingdom Web Ministry can handle the site if Malagentia is ever without an official web minister. All local group sites must now be hosted on the Kingdom web server, and Wordpress sites (such as ours) must now have an admin account for the Kingdom Web Minister. From The Captain of the Archers

The snow flies like arrows, and the wind

is as keen as any broadhead. At times it's hard to believe that spring will come. Still, the longest nights are already behind us. February will soon yield to March, and March to April. And then....

But what to do while you're waiting? This is the perfect time to overhaul your equipment. Check arrows closely for damage. Break and discard any cracked arrows, but save the points, nocks and fletching. Cut the shafts short for convenience. Heads can usually be removed by heating. (I use the kitchen stove after Larissa has retired for the night. A few seconds in the microwave will soften glue enough to remove nocks without melting the plastic. Do NOT put metal in the microwave!)

Carefully strip fletching from broken shafts with a utility knife or single-edged razor blade. Refletching is best done with a special clamp called a fletching jig, but you can manage without one if you are careful. Fletching usually runs straight or at a slight angle (called helical). Be sure your replacement lies the same way as the feather you removed. (Leftright-wing feathers are different. Avoid using feathers from different sets of arrows unless they match!)

Whiskers on strings are not a good thing! Check your bowstring for signs of wear. Rub in a nice coat of wax. It might be a good idea to order a new one while you are thinking about it. Come spring, break in the new one and save your used string for backup. Nothing spoils an event like failing inspection and not being able to find a replacement on site!

Archery uses muscles in ways that few other activities do. Most of us lose strength

and accuracy during the off-season. There are a few places in the area where you can shoot indoors all winter: Lakeside Archery in Cumberland is one. Failing that, Google 'Archery Exercises'. A few minutes a day, every other day, and your April scores could look like it's October already!

By the time the snow melts, my SUV will be loaded and ready to assist anywhere in Malagentia. I am particularly anxious to help set up ranges in outlying parts of the Province. No aspiring archer should have to drive more than 30 minutes to practice! If you have an acre or two, I will help lay out a range. I have all the targets and loaner equipment needed. Name the time and place. I will come to you!

Or come to me. I have a small teaching range at my home in Falmouth. If I am in, it's open for Royal Rounds, IKACs, or coaching. I have loaner gear, plus bows and arrows for sale at my cost.

This year we will continue upgrading our targets. The round targets will be replaced on a three-year rotation. All of the old rectangular targets using foam insulation will be gone by GNEW, and the new metal frames will have wood facings to avoid breaking arrows. If things go according to plan, Messy the Moat Monster may be joined by another novelty target....Meanwhile, always need more marshals. You don't need to be a Master Bowman to be one! If you are interested, please contact me. I will get you trained and

Being an Ambassador

How To Serve New Members
Of The Society

o matter what time period or culture you pick in the SCA, we all have one thing in common—we were all once newcomers. No matter if your first experience was wonderful or chaotic, something about the SCA encouraged you to stay and participate.

Historically, SCAdians do not have a very good reputation at retaining new members. A group will focus on demos or other recruitment activities but once a new person is in the door, the enthusiasm diminishes and a newcomer is left to their own devices (no heraldry pun intended). I have actually sat in recruitment discussions where people say "If we can bring in 5-10 and we only keep a few, that's ok." That is not Ok! If people find the SCA and decide that medieval reenactment is not for them, that's one thing, but if people find the SCA, don't feel welcome, and leave—that's not ok. Most likely they will leave with negative feels and bad news always travels fast. So, a group who is actively recruiting new people should have a service plan for how these newcomers will be supported.

Developing a set of newcomer classes is the best way to inform the new members and provide them tools that will assist in their SCA assimilation. Our Society uses many terms and procedures that may

not be obvious to the outside world. Going to an event is automatic for some of us, but it can be confusing to someone who is new, as well as: how to feast, what clothes to wear, when to use the right greeting, etc. These issues can make or break a newcomer's event.

We all want to belong and feel a part of something. Those members who are in households get the support they need. Your group needs to provide that level of support to those new members who haven't found their niche or develop an interest level. Forming a newcomer group is a wonderful way to begin a retention plan. Calling the newcomer to make sure they have a ride, know about an event, or even help with directions is a valuable service to people. Inviting someone to sit under your pavilion, share space at the feast table or even asking them about their interests can make a newcomer feel good about their experience.

I have referred to current members as "SCA Ambassadors". How we treat our new people affects the future of our Society. I, for one, would like to attend our 100 year anniversary celebration. Let us all focus on bringing new people into the fold in a informative and supportive way.

Remaining Her Faithful Servant

Elegant Prose, Fancy Letters, and Pomping up the Dream

ourtly love, literary tropes dealing with idealized love among the aristocracy, can be found throughout medieval literature. The stories follow noblemen who make grand overtures for the hand of the fair maiden they seek, and there are several themes in our game which can be influenced by them.

The romantic concepts that are embodied by chivalry, artisanship, and the nature of what we are trying to create by way of "The Dream", doesn't only translate into actual love-based relationships. In fact, lots of the literature that had courtly love as core to the narrative was understood to be allegorical – generally either societal or religious. As a vehicle to add immersion into the idealized concept of the medieval period that the SCA portrays, this source material can be very effective. Don't think that you need to be an exceptionally skilled wordsmith to make this work either. Like all arts, writing this way can

(*Faithful Servant continued from page 8*) be done right by being aware of historical precedents, the right tools, practicing and refining.

The Ideal

As unrelated as it may seem, Courtly Love became a way to teach younger lords how to interact with those above them in station. By propelling their desired counterparts into higher strata, young men were taking what could be unfettered emotions (QED, the tales of The Wife of Bath) and focusing them towards learning how to navigate the social ladder. Gentles who addressed ladies in this manner were seeking to be thought of highly enough to serve them, not be brought into equal standing. They were, in some way, "flawed" by this malignity (represented early by Ovid, in the concept of love-sickness) and thus can only be cured by being found worthy by the lady they sought.

It's also important to note that the concept of marriage based on love was still somewhat foreign for most of the medieval

period. Marriages were alliances between houses, kingdoms, or noble families. With roots in a staunchly male-centric society, these courtly romances served as a female-centric counterbalance. For men to

desire a woman was for them to go against the societal norms that governed their actions. Affairs of the heart were far too serious to be combined with politics, and several Non-European cultures considered them gifts from divine forces.

Whether or not these relationships influenced the literature emerging at the time or vice-versa is still up for some debate, but there are several shared characteristics in both the continental "Romanz" style literature and Troubadour poetry. It is documentable back to 11th Century Aquitane and Provence, and the emergence of gai saber, itself an attempt to offer a new take on traditional Christian values regarding society. The philosophy was supported by rich, female nobles and by the 13th Century began to appear in documentary evidence from courts throughout the continent. The French court equivalent, "Fin Amour", took on a character of its own outside of literature.

Once it was embraced by the aristocracy, a deeply rooted sense of gamesmanship among lovers emerged. The SCA has co-opted several rituals associated with courtly love, the most common being favors gifted to fighters from consorts, cohorts,

figureheads, and nobility. These symbols can be seen in site tokens, household favors, tournament favors, artisanal exchanges, and the list goes on.

While our definition has expanded the use of such tokens, their purpose historically was to reward a caller found worthy by the lady pursued; they were gifting them with an extension of themselves.

All manner of gifts were extended to them, and though nothing was ever asked for in return, this was a way for the domina to show her favorite servus that he was on the right track. Secrecy was strictly adhered to, save for only the most trusted confidantes, as these relationships were frequently adulterous. Thus, while the lady may be lavishly courted, her responses were subtle in return.

References

Understanding the origins of the courtly love ideal is important to craft your approach. Ultimately, having access to specific examples of the language and character of this ideal will be your best tool to learn how the language should flow. Luckily, there are scores of resources available from a variety of different angles, time periods and locations. This list should certainly not be considered comprehensive, even within the scope of Continental Europe. These quotes all play on several standard tropes: supernatural intervention, elevation of the object of desire, and weakness or failings on the part of pursuer.

Theocritus is a Greek poet from the 3rd Century BC, and is credited with a series of bucolic and mimetic poems, epics and lyric poetry. There are questions as to the authenticity of some of the works which have been credited to him, but there is still ample material regardless.

"One half of my life, I am conscious, has flown/ The residue lives on your image alone.


Fair she is, as other damsels: but for what the simplest swain/ Claims from the demurest maiden, I must sue and sue in vain.

Yesterday I watched her pass me, and from down-dropt eyelids peep At the face she dared not gaze on--every moment blushing more--

And my love took hold upon me as it never took before."

Some of the most romantic poetry ever penned can be found in the Song of Songs, the Canticles of King Solomon. While considered scriptural since the 2nd Century, these writings do not discuss covenant or

wisdom like you would find in the other books of the Old Testament. They deal with physical love, and although scholars consider them allegorical, as a reference to God's love for Israel, the language can certainly be treated literally as describing a holy coupling between man and woman. They are considered the birth of the concept of the Holy Garden, which has been used as allusion to an object of sexual desire.

"We rejoice and delight in you; we will praise your love more than wine.

Like a lily among thorns is my darling among women. You have stolen my heart, my sister, my bride; you have stolen my heart with one glance of your eyes"

Marie de France is a poet from 12th Century France and England who was associated with the court of Henry II. Notably, the last poem attributed to her, "Eliduc", tells the story of a Bretonese knight and his lover. It contains many of the tropes discussed above – the secrecy, the trusted emissary of messages between lovers, and objects meant to signify his love.

"But the maiden, from whom he came, was willing to take him as her knight! If such was her will, might any pluck him from her hand?

There is no Emperor, under Heaven, if he were tendered your tenderness, but would go the more lightly for your grace

The two lovers spoke no further; each was well assured of what was in the other's heart."

I have set my heart on a maiden, and she, on me. If, now, we part, there is no help that one, or both, of us, must die. Yet go I must."

Walther von der Vogelweide, 12th Century German, was a minnesinger who eventually settled in the court of Dukes Frederick I and Leopold VI. He has numerous lyric poems attributed to him, and was well known for his idealized poetic forms. While his works, and the works of contemporary Wolfram von Eschenbach, are largely available, they are rarely available in translation, appearing almost exclusively in Middle High German.

"He who has a good woman's love is ashamed of every ill deed

Under the linden/on the heath/where we two had our bed/ you still can see/

lovely both/broken flowers and grass."

Finally, Petrarch is easily one of the most well-known Italian medieval poets. His influence over 14th Century art and literature is immense, and among his satires, moral biographies, and religious works is "Il Canzoniere", a collection of 366 poems dedicated to a woman identified as Laura both by name and in epigrams throughout the work.

"It was on that day when the sun's ray/ was darkened in pity for its Maker, /that I was captured, and did not defend myself, /because your lovely eyes had bound me, Lady. She, who is the sun among those ladies, /shining the rays of her lovely eyes on me.

The nightingale that laments and weeps /all night long, sweetly, in the shadows, / fills the heart with thoughts of love.

Bitter tears pour down my face /with an anguished storm of sighing, /when my eyes chance to turn on you / through whom alone I am lost from the world."

So You Think You Want to Build a Wardo


Or "How Not To Make The Same Mistakes I Made"

very person who builds a camper trailer will have different goals. Some will want a home that they will use at a major war like Pennsic, while others will want something they can take to every camping event they go to. Some people spend a lot of time hanging out inside their tent and want the inside to have room and be a showpiece, while others hang out in their camp's common area and use their tent only for sleeping. Because of this, there is often no one best way to do something. Something that worked well for one person may or may not be the right

thing for you. My hope is that after reading this you will have an idea of what to think about when making your own travel trailer, and hopefully learn from some of my mistakes. If you see a camper trailer that you like, try and talk to the builder. Something that seems really cool may have been a major pain in the ass that they would never do again, while something you barely notice might actually be a major improvement they added later.

In trying to keep this article to a reasonable length, I am going to leave out what I learned about welding my own trailer frame since I think few people are likely to go that route. If you think you (Vardo continues page 12)

might want to do that, feel free to talk to me. I have a number of things I would change about that part of the build.

I wanted a trailer that I could tow to many events, so I needed to keep it light enough to be pulled by my Subaru Forester. I would have loved an Italian Villa or a Hungarian Cottage, but the planning for those was just too heavy. So I realized that I had to have a canvas top, which led me to the bow-top Gypsy wagon. One of my friends has a trailer that is stored at Pennsic, and for her a shepherd's cottage, which looks like a shed on wheels ¹ is a better choice. She had to borrow a friend's truck to get it to Pennsic, but now that it is there, Cooper's staff moves it for her. The peaked solid roof is great for keeping out rodents and shedding snow. But it would be very expensive to tow regularly because of how heavy and non-aerodynamic it is. My trailer with its flat top and tarp could have rodents chew through the tarp, and water and snow buildup on the tarp is definitely a concern.

Draw Out Your Plans

Once you have an idea of what you want, draw it out, preferably in a scale drafting. Pictures are the best way to communicate to your friends helping you what you want. It also allows you to find problems in your plans through drawing. Drawing things in both open and closed positions will help you spot if things interfere with each other before you find out when it is too late to change it. I wish I had drawn my door open because then I would have noticed that the door would open into the overhang of the roof.

It ends up that actual Vardos noticed this same problem because the upper part of the dutch door is two shutters instead of a single shutter. And definitely draft a folding trailer in both positions. If you want to be careful, you can even draft each stage of the setup / pack down to see if any single step will have problems. When I was trying to have a solid roof, I realized that folding both the side and end walls at the same height causes them to want to be in the same space. The more information that you include in pictures the less likely you will have problems. The folding walls drafting shows how you need to fold the walls at different heights, like Tiernan did on her Roman Wagon, to keep the first from fouling the second.

The more detail you show, the more likely you will avoid problems. The drafting does not include the hinges, which when mortised will have the knuckle sticking up. The hinge will foul the first wall that folds. I didn't think to draft the 2x4 braces that keep my tarp from sagging when towing, and I was lucky that the shelves I built were not ½ inch taller or they would have interfered.

Understand Your Towing Capacity

Most vehicles have some towing capacity, which is rated in how heavy the trailer can be. It takes no account into how much aerodynamic drag the trailer creates. So if you have a trailer that is wider and/or taller than your tow vehicle, and near maximum weight, you could run into problems anyway. Be sure to dig around the towing capacity numbers for your vehicle. It ends up that a Subaru Forester can pull 2000 lbs, but can only brake 1000 lbs. So a trailer that is over 1000 lbs needs its own brakes. If you know a mechanic, you might ask about the weak point in the design of your vehicle. My brother suggested I add a transmission cooler to since Subarus sometimes have transmission issues. Your vehicle manual may also suggest other changes like changing your tire pressure.

All Trailer Frames Are Not The Same

All trailer frames are not interchangeable. Besides the size of the trailer, trailers are going to be rated for different weights. There are standard classes which relate to how much weight a (*Vardo continues page 13*)

hitch is designed to handle. A class I is 2000 lbs and will use a minimum of a 1-7/8" ball. A class II is 3500 lbs and will use a 2" ball. Because of these classes, you will find that trailers are often designed for the different towing capacity of a vehicle. So you will find a frame that is designed for 2000 lbs or slightly under, but rarely will you find one rated for just a little over because that would require the next class of hitch.

There are 3 things that affect the capacity of a trailer: the axle, the coupler and the frame. Whatever is the weakest part is going to create the maximum capacity for the trailer. The reason I mention this was that I was thinking about buying a utility trailer and cutting off the raised sides to use as a base. I didn't do it when I realized that the sides are structural and doing so would severely weaken the frame.

Having a strong frame is perhaps more important for a camper then a normal trailer. The rating is great for determining if a trailer is safe for the towing portion, but a camper gets loaded in two configurations. When set up you will be adding the weight of people inside the trailer which may exceed the rated weight. I have had to set up with the corners on jacks and one tire lifted 6 inches off the ground. Even though a frame could be strong enough to take this, if it is not stiff enough, it can flex, causing the

door to bind. At some point I am going to have to get under my frame and weld in reinforcements for this reason. Until then, I have an extra stabilizer under the door.

Some trailers have brakes. These are either hydraulic or electric, but what is the most important is how they know to operate. Some get an electric signal

from the car, and depending on how strong, it varies how much it brakes. These require adding a brake controller to the tow vehicle if you want the brakes to work. They will have at least 5 pins on the electrical connector. The other style is a sliding coupler for the hitch. This notices if the trailer is overtaking the tow vehicle, and brakes accordingly. This type of brake needs to have something that senses if the trailer is in reverse, otherwise the brakes will be locked up every time you need to back up the trailer.

Stabilizer Jacks

Stabilizer jacks are little folding feet or stands on the corners of the trailer that keep the trailer from rocking while you are moving about inside. You may also be able to use the jack on the hitch for a front stabilizer. There are also some that look more like a jack stand that you place on the ground and then tighten up to the frame. The jack stand style ones are great on firm, level ground. They leave something to be desired on the muddy, sloping ground of the Pennsic Swamp. I upgraded to bolt-on scissor jacks, because the jack stands will hold the position of the trailer, but they don't have the leverage to lift the trailer if it is out of level. I also was afraid of the jack stand slipping in the mud and dropping the corner of the trailer, especially when I had the wheel off the ground. Since the scissor jacks are bolted on, I am not as concerned about them slipping. Having the leverage to lift the trailer can also give the leverage necessary to twist your frame if you don't pay attention during setup.

Legally Towing Your Trailer

I was a little amazed about how little you have to do to prove your trailer is street-worthy. Technically in the state of Maine, any trailer with a bed is a camper trailer. Camper Trailers are more expensive to register and require a state marshal to come and install a VIN for the trailer. (This gets mounted to metal, so leave something visible in your towing configuration.) Request the VIN well in advance. The year I built my trailer it took 3 weeks, but estimated from 2 to 4. If you make this officially a camping trailer, then you cannot get tags until you have the VIN. But other than taking photos and measurements, and asking the weight capacity, there did not seem to be any other inspection. So as near as I can tell, make sure that your axle is rated for the weight you specify, and follow the Federal Trailer Lighting Requirements ². Had I found this before I welded the frame, I would have tried to make the trailer under 80 inches wide, instead of 81 inches.

Maximize Your Space

A camping trailer is a lot like an RV or a boat in that you want to maximize your space. Any empty space could be a storage cubby. Lift the bed a little so that you can store bins under it, but don't lift it so high that you have problems getting into it. Since the back of the bed can be hard to access, a hatch on the outside will let you access the back of the storage without moving everything in front of it. This space may not be great for things you use regularly inside the trailer, but is a great space for armor, kitchen supplies, or common area gear. It would also make a great place to store the I-hope-I-don't-need-this item like the spare tire, but then you need

to make the hatch big enough to fit the tire through it.

Custom storage spaces can be great to avoid wasted space, but you should only do this for items that you are unlikely to upgrade or replace. Otherwise the replacement item might not fit. So a mirror box, or other period

item might be well suited for a well sized storage space, but a cook stove or a fire extinguisher might be a different size when you need to replace it.

Items that can do double duty are also useful. I have a single step to get into my trailer, which is pretty much a reinforced empty box. A vardo I saw at Pennsic made this a small chest. I realize that this is the perfect solution for the where to store the tools and parts needed for setup, or a great location for stuff that your campmates borrow all the time. An even better dual use thing is if you can have parts that you need in your travel position to also function as something when you are camping. All of my stick lumber that is used when setup to reinforce the folding parts gets laid under the tarp when traveling to help support the tarp from loading up with water. The rope I use for securing my bins during travel doubles as my clothesline during the event. Maybe I can figure out a second use for the 2x4's that hold up my tarp during travel.

Another way that items can do double duty is that the cabinets in the trailer can help to brace and stiffen the walls. The cabinets don't even need backs, because the walls can be the back.

What to do about the trailer hitch.


maximize your space. Any empty

When you are set up for camping, one of the things that give away the modern world is the trailer hitch (and the rubber tires, but I am more forgiving of those). The removable hitch on my Vardo is not practical on most trailers. The two solutions I see the most are to put the hitch on the opposite side of the door so that it is not so obvious or to make a porch that goes over the hitch. Both have their advantages, but it depends on how you are going to use the trailer. Having the door on the hitch side forces you to either face away from the common area, or to drive through the common area if you need to set up late or leave early. Having the door on the rear of the trailer will make you need to be able to drive to the

perimeter of your camp site, which can be a problem if you set up on a tree line, or next to a ravine.

The other problem with the trailer hitch is that it likes to take out people's shins in the middle of the night. Putting something around the hitch that is closer to eye height can both hide it and protect people who think they are taking a shortcut to the porta-castles in the middle of the night. I have seen horse cutouts used, but you could also have a table that goes over the top, or use some solar lights to keep it visible in the dark.

Water Is Not Your Friend

The biggest problem with a wooden structure is it rots. Water can wick into cracks and cause the boards to rot out. Paint is your first line of defense, but smart building can help. I really wanted to make a fancy little hatch where it disappears and is not noticeable except for the lock. Making it swing out meant exterior hinges, and swinging in meant I lost storage space. So I built a little cup that went around the fixed panel and I thought I was good – until our first good rain and I noticed that the rain was inside the storage area. I had mistakenly made the hatch catch water and funnel it inside the vardo. Had I made the cup on the upper section and facing down, this would not have been a problem.

I also noticed that in a really driving rain that the joint in the folding part of my walls can let in water. Was I to do it again, I would angle the joint maybe 10 degrees so that the water would have to go uphill to get in. I also would put a 10 degree angle on the tops of any horizontal boards so that water would not pool (I think someone figured this out years ago since home builders do this on window sills). If you don't have a table saw, you could also offset your joint which will allow water to pool, but not get

inside the trailer.

Canvas and water are also not always friends. If you buy a premade tarp, be aware that the seams usually run the long direction to minimize the number of seams. And the fabric is overlapped and stitched, which makes the seam shed water in one direction and catch water in the other. On my tarp the seams were in the same direction, so when I put the canvas over the vardo, one side would shed water, and one would catch. Hamilton Marine does sell a spray on product that will help with the waterproofing on canvas. My second canvas top I sewed myself and made sure that the seams ran vertical instead of horizontally. I also took Master Maxton Gunn's advice from his tent making instructions and used heavy cotton thread so the cotton will swell when wet and seal the stitch holes.

The other way that water and canvas are not friends is that a tarp that gets wet and then bakes in a hot sun will shrink. I am not sure how much my first tarp shrank, but I preshrunk the second one and that one shrank from 12 ft to 10 ft 6, or over 12%. I was not using tent canvas, so that may be preshrunk, but if not, you may want to plan for it to shrink a little.

I hope that you are inspired to make your own camper trailer someday, and I hopefully you won't repeat mistakes I made.

Did You Know...

Toasts and Precedence

Toasts are a common occurrence at feasts, but did you know there is a traditional and formal procedure to offering them here in the East?


There are six toasts to be offered at every feast: to the King and Queen, to the Prince and Princess, to the Baron and Baroness (if the feast is served in a Barony), to the Chief Cook and the Kitchen Staff, to the Autocrat and Event Staff, and finally to Absent Friends.

Now, before you jump up to offer one of these toasts, it is also tradition that they are offered by peers based on the Order of Precedence. Toasting order is usually arranged by the Herald and if a peer should decline making the toast, the Herald offers it to the next peer in line.

While these six toasts should be given in order, they should not all be made at the same time. Feasts are a time for conversation, cheer, and of course, dining so these things shouldn't be interrupted by a string of toasts all in a row. Toasts to the King and Queen and the Prince and Princess are usually offered at the beginning of the feast. The toast to absent friends should come at the end of the meal, but before the last dishes are served.
