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
Well,, maybe not today, but if you want to get started before the ground dries out, there are some options. Magnus found that Lakeside Archery (55 Cumberland Road, N. Yarmouth 04097, 207-829-6213) has a good number of lanes (16) and a 20 yard indoor course. They charge \$13/hr and you do need to wait for the entire line to finish before retrieving. They also have an outside course with about 80 yards maximum range. https://lakesidearchery.com

There's another place in Gray, Howell's Indoor Range and Gunshop, (81 W. Gray Road, Gray 04039) which does have an indoor archery range, it's \$10/hr but there's only room for about 2 people at a time. This shop is more firearm oriented than Lakeside Archery, and you can find them on the web at https://howellsgunshop.com. Both places have archery supplies, so if you need something and don't want to visit Bean's or Cabella's, this might be right for you. Because of the nature of both places, we think it will be easier for interested archers to visit on their own to shoot should they choose.

One part of SCA archery you might not be aware of, is that there's another site for scores and challenges, besides the East's https:// archery.eastkingdom.org/. Send your mouse on a journey to https://scores-sca.org/ - you'll find a list of SCA Kingdom scores, information about the Inter Kingdom Archery Competition, which you may have heard of as IKAC, and a community with a newsletter – Quivers & Quarrels. There hasn't been a new newsletter released since October 2021, but the content there is still good. Well, hopefully it will be, as soon as SCA.org figures out how to get old newsletter archives back up again.

But the newsletter isn't the main point.

On the left side of the site, under "Shoots" you'll see SSAC. It lists a pretty hefty list of different novelty shoots. There's Anti-FITA, which looks like the square below. It's intended for a 20 yard shoot, and scores like this: Starting at the smallest triangle out at the outside corner: 8 pts, 6 pts, 4 pts, 2 pts for the longest stripe, and that big space in the middle is worth nothing. The catch is that each corner must be kept with the same number of arrows, monopoly style. That is you must have one scoring arrow in each corner before a second arrow may be scored in any corner.



There are other shoots like the Quarterly & Saltire, which uses two targets, one divided quarterly (vertical and horizontal divisions) and one divided diagonally, with circles in the various divisions. Another is a Golf Shoot, where you score the points un-hit on a tic-tac-toe grid with numbers.

Why are there all these shoots? Well, partly because people get bored just shooting concentric circle FITA targets, but also because this is a way to compete with yourself and the community, by having the shoot at home or a local range, and then submitting the scores to the SSAC scorekeeper. All the rules and information you need is on the page. Take a look, see if there's something you like, we can try it at a future practice.

A Spring Brew

The moon was full, the winter was long, and I am unsupervised (with adult money). And last year spent far too much time on the internet where I discovered someone's claim to having made wine from peeps. Easter season has returned and with it 7 boxes of blue peeps made their way into a carboy with some warm water, some champagne yeast, and a smattering of feral cackling. Time passed, the brew burbled, and I started to ponder.....

The moon was dark, the spring was warming, and Auntie Arwen's is ever so helpful. Passing the unnatural concoction on my counter as the light grew and the days lengthened, I came to feel it needed a counterpoint, or perhaps a counterweight. Marshmallow root is used medicinally in fine and tasty teas. But humans can be clever creatures, and if it tastes good we will find a way to use it for more than the fixing of a sore throat. A little digging uncovered that is it possible to make candy directly from the root. A little further digging turned up that ancient Egyptians were turning it into sticky treats 4000 years ago^[1]. Helpfully, the internet served up several recipes for making marshmallows directly from the root. Thus, for science, a new experiment was brewed to keep company with the first.

A 1 gallon carboy, an appropriate mix of honey and water, roughly 3oz of marshmallow root, champagne yeast, and a quantity of vanilla extract (to test another theory about how extract will fair in the fermentation process vs the bean). Remember, like garlic, vanilla extract is measured from the heart with enthusiasm. Everything brought together, my kitchen smelling pleasant in a very odd manner, or odd in a very pleasant manner, the wait begins^[2]. A murky vividly yellow concoction burbles happily next to one that is of the most eye-searing blue and a few more cackles fill the air. If anything, the peep blend seems happier and more active with its new friend beside it.

Now there is naught to do but research old, possibly eldritch, confection recipes to use for the last ounce of root while I wait for the yeast to do its work. Who knows what will happened when the moon is gibbous, the summer is muggy, and research has been conducted?

^[2] 1 gallon of water, 2lbs honey (ish), 3oz of marshmallow root by eyeballed, a sufficient quantity of vanilla extract sufficient unto making the heart happy, boil for the time it takes to brew the tea, steep the tea, take up your book, forget the tea, remember the tea, and drink the now cool tea. Strain, pour strained liquid into the carboy and wait until it cools to happy yeast temperature. Add roughly 1/4 - 1/3 packet of champagne yeast, give it a good bit of side eye to make sure it starts reacting, and cap with an air lock. Cackle for good measure.
